# LOCAL ACTION: WATERTOWN ORGANIZATIONS

In white-dominant "progressive" parts of the United States, there's a pervasive myth that racism happens in other parts of the country, but not in our own communities. In fact, racism exists in every town in the U.S., and there's work to be done wherever you find yourself. There are several organizations in Watertown focused on racial justice, equity, and civic engagement which are actively seeking new voices, leadership, and volunteers.

# Kingian Response Team

We work to apply Dr. King's philosophy and methodology of nonviolence to actively expose, confront and collectively dismantle structural racism across our local institutions in the wake of George Floyd's murder.

Our intergenerational, multiracial leadership team facilitates monthly community wide meetings and leads ongoing action-based groups in calling for our local school department, police department and town council to commit to an antiracist Listen-Learn-Grow-Act pledge, with collectively determined policy shifts under each category. We are also calling on ourselves and our community to likewise pledge to listen, learn, grow and act to end racism.

# **Watertown Pigsgusset Initiative**

Pigsgusset Initiative works to educate and engage Watertown residents in critical conversations about the erasure of the Indigenous history in the place we call home. Pigsgusset is how the Pequossette Band of the Massachusett Tribe and their neighbors the Nipmuc and Wampanoag referred to this land. We recognize this is an English language rendering of an Indigenous word, which to the best of our knowledge means "the meadows at the widening of the river."

One of our primary goals is to educate ourselves and our community about who we are centering in our civic spaces, our monuments, our school curricula and our civic life. We initially seek to change the name of the town square, currently the Columbus Delta, to something more inclusive, and are planning a project to provide signage for Watertown public spaces that identifies their connection to the Original Peoples of this region.

Pigsgusset Initiative is collaborating with the Watertown Free Public Library and New Repertory Theatre to organize an online event related to the company's next Watertown Historical Moving Play, which will center local Indigenous history. # **MUTUAL AID**

"Solidary, not charity" Mutual Aid Networks are rooted in reciprocity and egalitarianism. They consist of collective action to make sure everyone in the community has their needs met. Mutual Aid networks became increasingly important during the COVID-19 pandemic when governments at the municipal, state, and federal levels failed to provide emergency services in the face of health and economic crises.

# CONVERSATIONS ABOUT RACE AND OPPRESSION

Talk to your loved ones, your co-workers, and even yourself

## Conversing and processing

We can cultivate interpersonal conversations about our socialization into oppressor and oppressed roles using **Listening Partnerships** from **Youth on Board** (<u>ListeningWorks Videos</u>).

Listening Partnerships are a powerful way to practice self reflection in a relationship with one another. They help prevent burnout and encourage mindfulness around our responses to interpersonal and systemic harm.

In addition, an important byproduct of listening partnerships is that they build stronger bonds between partners and communities. A Listening Partnership is a simple conversational tool where one partner speaks in response to a prompt for a given time while the other partner listens with loving intent, and then partners switch roles.

# **BOSTON AND MASSACHUSETTS ORGANIZATIONS**

# Families for Justice as Healing (FJAH)

Families for Justice as Healing is led by incarcerated women, formerly incarcerated women, and women with incarcerated loved ones. Our mission is to end the incarceration of women and girls. We are unapologetically focused on women and girls and we are abolitionists. We are proud members of the National Council of Incarcerated Women and Girls. We are closely connected with our sister organization, Sisters Unchained. We are a part of the National Participatory Defense Network.

We lead advocacy to decarcerate women and girls in Massachusetts. We organize in the most incarcerated communities in the Commonwealth to transform the way we respond to harm and develop alternatives to police, courts, and incarceration. The approach we take to our work is #ReimaginingCommunities. We don't need or want any new jails or prisons. Formerly incarcerated women have the solutions and expertise to address the root causes of incarceration.

We are leading work to shift resources away from the criminal punishment system and into Black and Brown communities so we can have housing, healthcare, education, economic development, and community-led organizations.

#### **Violence in Boston**

The mission of Violence in Boston is to improve the quality of life & life outcomes of individuals from disenfranchised communities by reducing the prevalence of violence and the impact of associated trauma. VIB was established with \$1,000 in 2017.

Since the work began in 2009, it has been privately, personally, and crowdfunding all activities, with no financial assistance from government agencies or officials. In order to scale up the work - necessary due to the increase in violence survivorship, it is evident that VIB must partner with governing bodies in order to redress the hidden burden resulting from violence exposure.

Through this partnership, Monica will lead VIB in becoming a one-stop-shop for comprehensive victim services. The plan is to provide any resident, who experiences any form of violence, the ability to walk in and obtain all required assistance from VIB staff.

# NATIONAL RACIAL JUSTICE ORGANIZATIONS

The Movement for Black Lives (M4BL) <a href="https://m4bl.org/">https://m4bl.org/</a>, formed in December of 2014, was created as a space for Black organizations across the country to debate and discuss the current political conditions; develop shared assessments of what political interventions are necessary in order to achieve key policy, cultural, and political wins; and convene organizational leadership in order to debate and co-create a shared movement-wide strategy.

The Movement for Black Lives works under the fundamental idea that we can achieve more together than we can separately. The Movement for Black Lives website has resources on a number of campaigns and visions including "End the War on Black Communities", "End to All Jails, Prisons, and Immigration Detention", "End the War on Drugs", and "End the Surveillance on Black Communities".

**Black Lives Matter (BLM)** <a href="https://blacklivesmatter.com/">https://blacklivesmatter.com/</a> was founded in 2013 in response to the acquittal of Trayvon Martin's murderer. Black Lives Matter Global Network Foundation, Inc. is a global organization in the US, UK, and Canada, whose mission is to eradicate white supremacy and build local power to intervene in violence inflicted on Black communities by the state and vigilantes. By combating and countering acts of violence, creating space for Black imagination and innovation, and centering Black joy, we are winning immediate improvements in our lives.
